

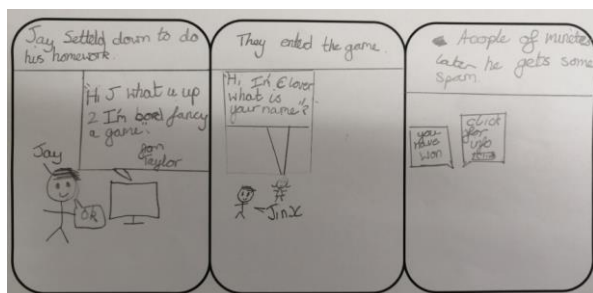
Safer Internet Day 2019 at Corsham Regis

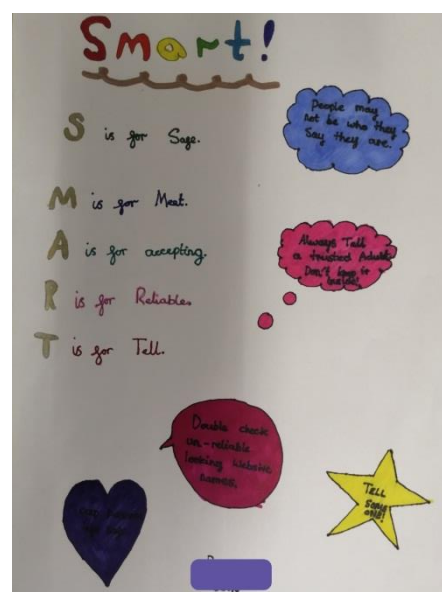
After Miss Denning took the whole school for a Safer Internet Day themed assembly, each class went off to explore this message in their own way, with many pupils creating posters for a competition being run by the Corsham Institute.



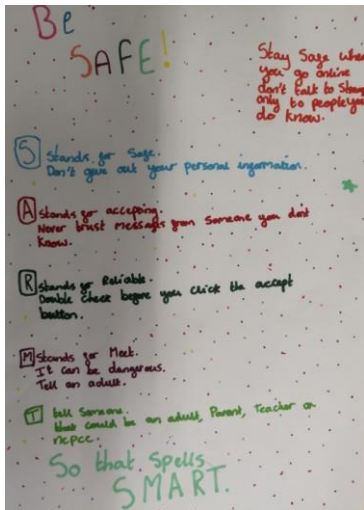
In Garnet and Topaz classes, pupils discussed the meaning of the word 'consent' and debated what they would do in a range of scenarios. The pupils particularly enjoyed

watching an online safety video about permission and sharing their own experiences.

In Amethyst Class, the children found it particularly interesting learning about the variety of different websites that can lead to problems when accessed. They also debated the meanings of 'consent' and 'permission' before using drama to create scenarios of their own when they had to ask for permission.

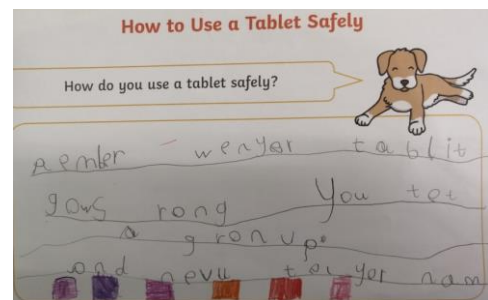


Pupils in Opal Class really enjoyed learning the Safer Internet Day song, writing a story about a character called Buddy, who was given a new tablet, and playing games to help them better understand the concept of permission.

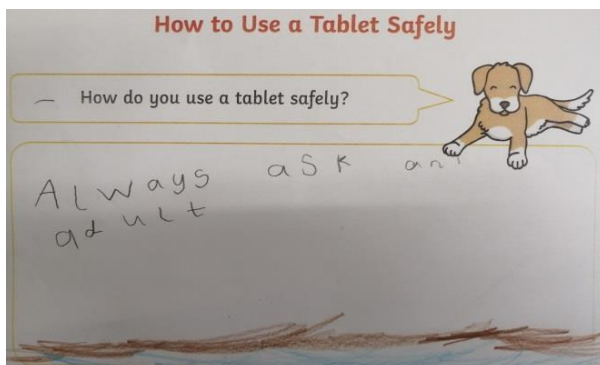
