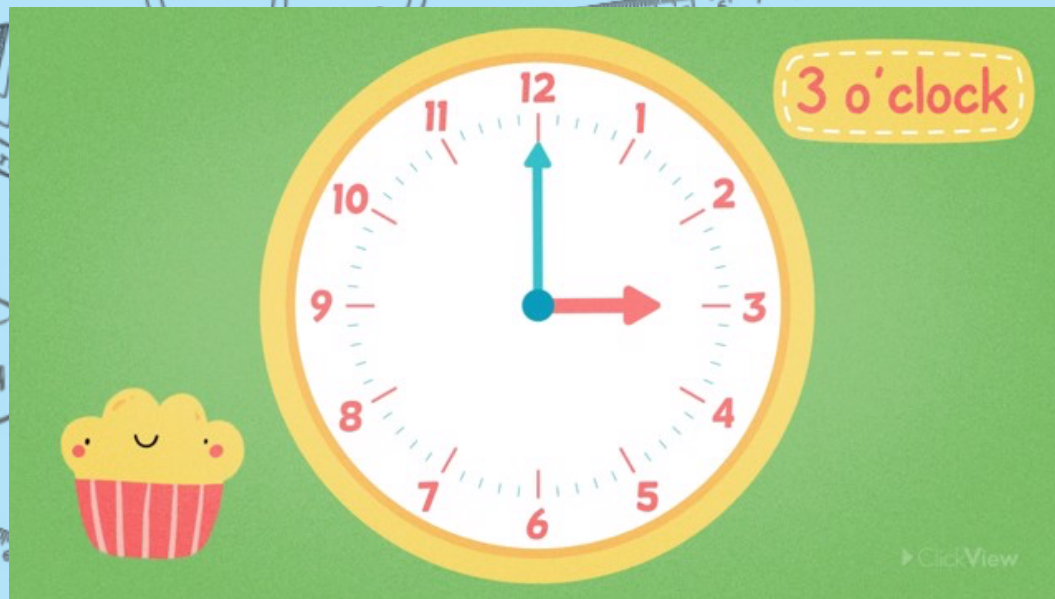


O'clock Times



Clocks



Time is measured in years, months, weeks, days, hours, minutes and seconds. We use clocks to measure time.



There are **24** hours in a day, which is made up of **2** lots of **12** hours.

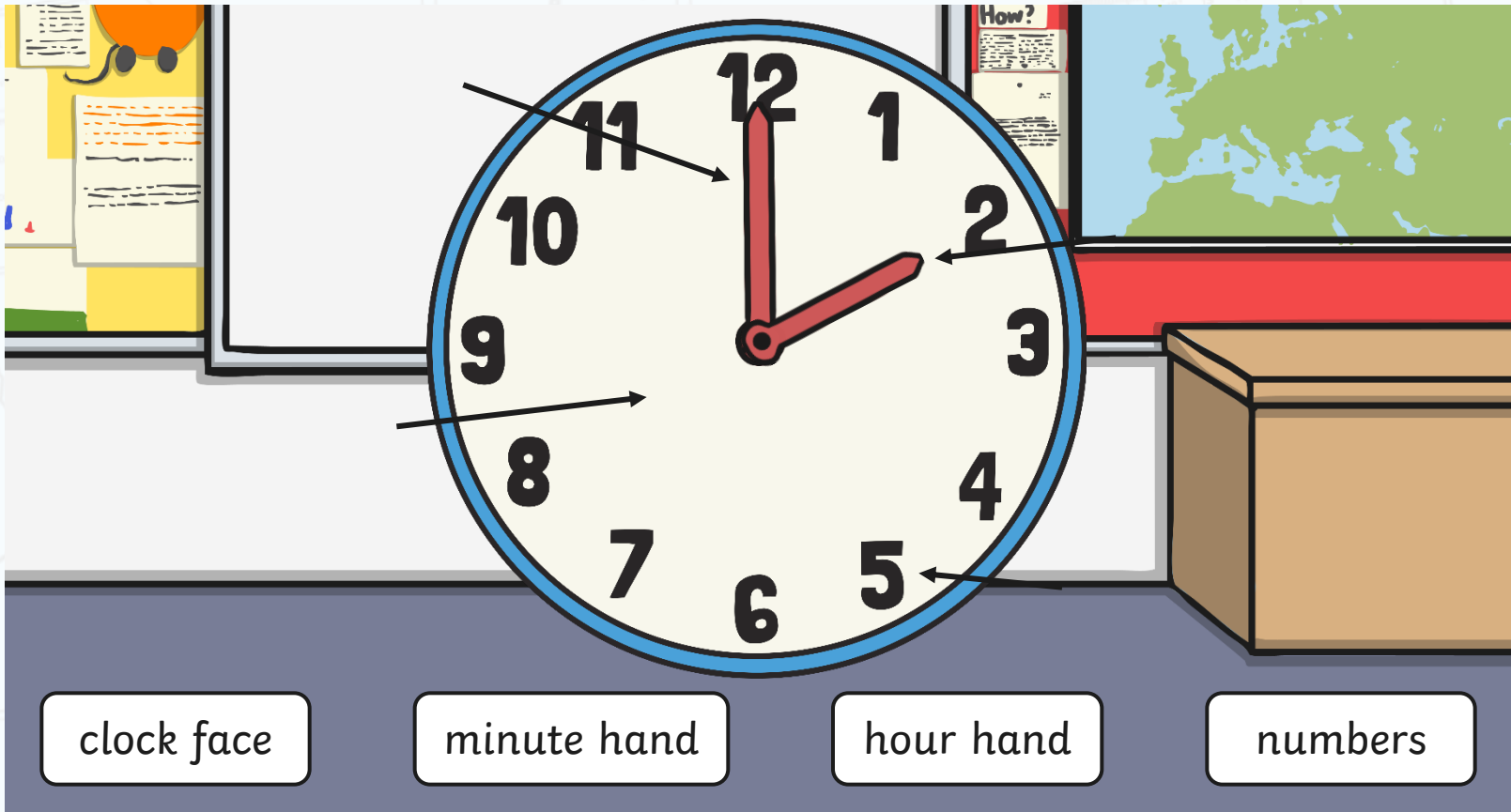
12 hours in the first half of the day and **12** hours in the second half of the day.

1 hour is made up of **60** minutes.

Clocks



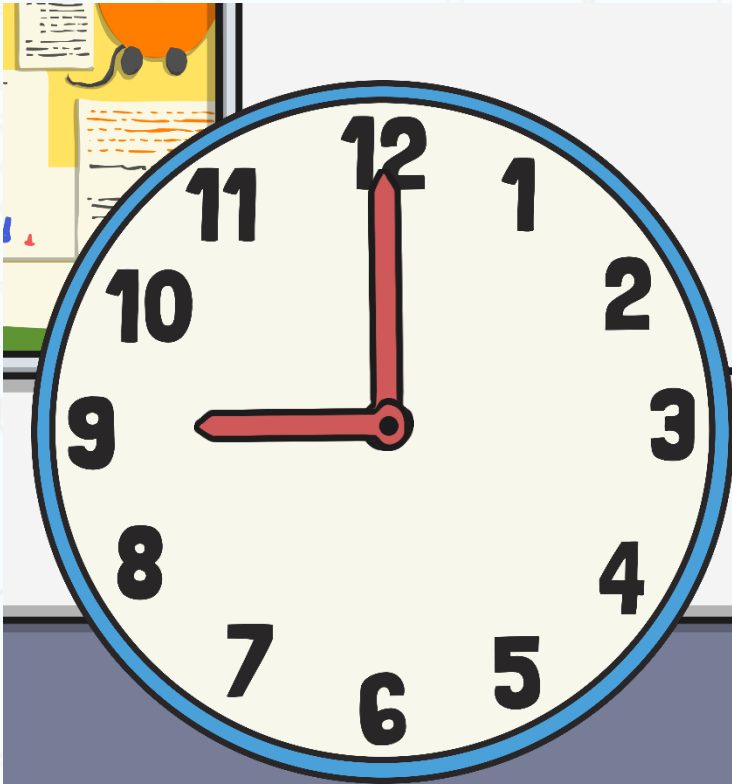
We use clocks to tell us the time. What are these parts of the clock called?



Clocks



We use clocks to tell us the time.



The small hand tells us what hour it is. We call this the hour hand.

The big hand tells us how many minutes past or to each hour it is. We call this the minute hand.

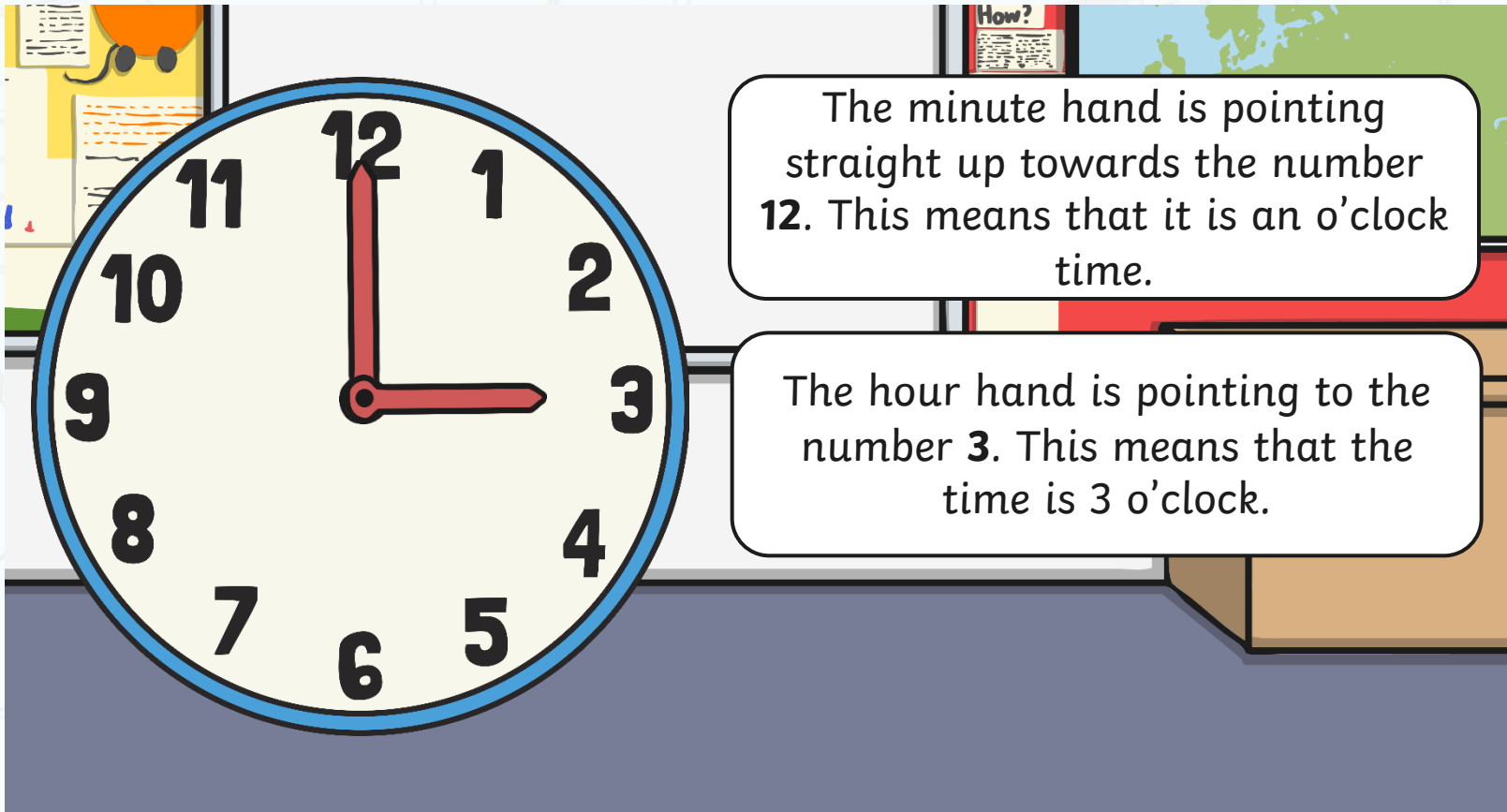
When the minute hand points straight up to the number **12**, this tells us that it is an 'o'clock' time.

This is when a new hour starts.

Clocks



We use clocks to tell us the time.



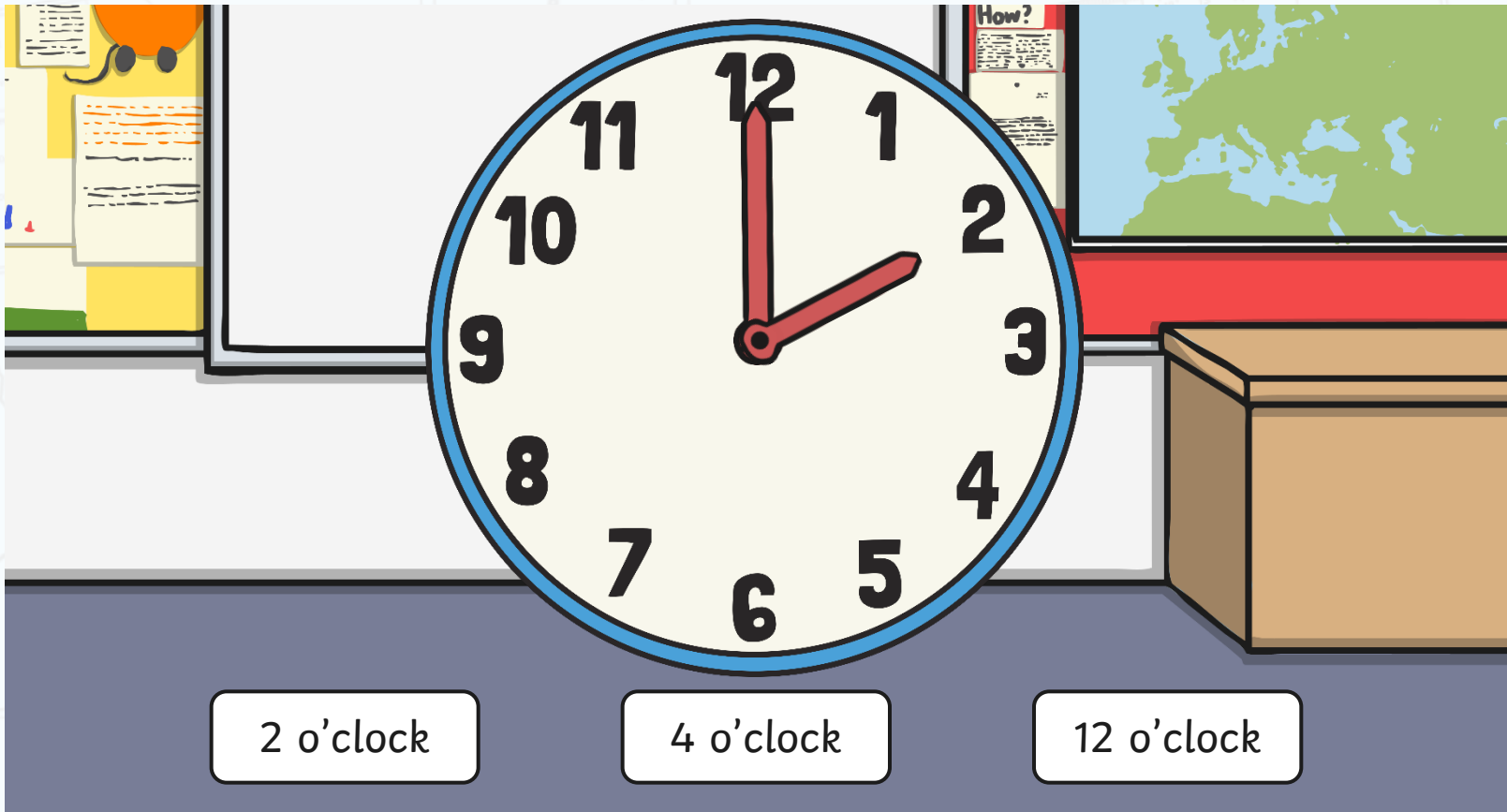
The minute hand is pointing straight up towards the number **12**. This means that it is an o'clock time.

The hour hand is pointing to the number **3**. This means that the time is 3 o'clock.

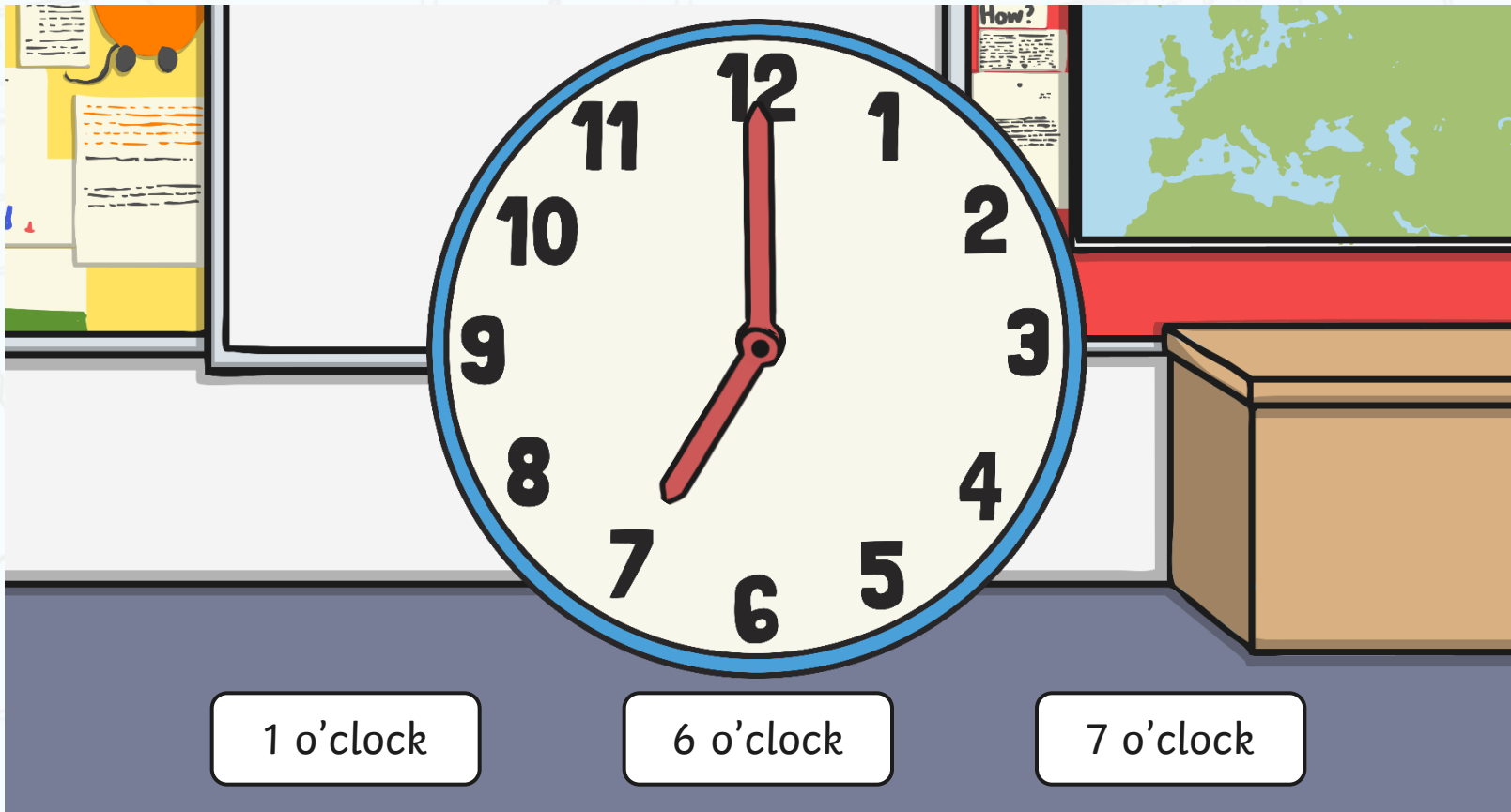

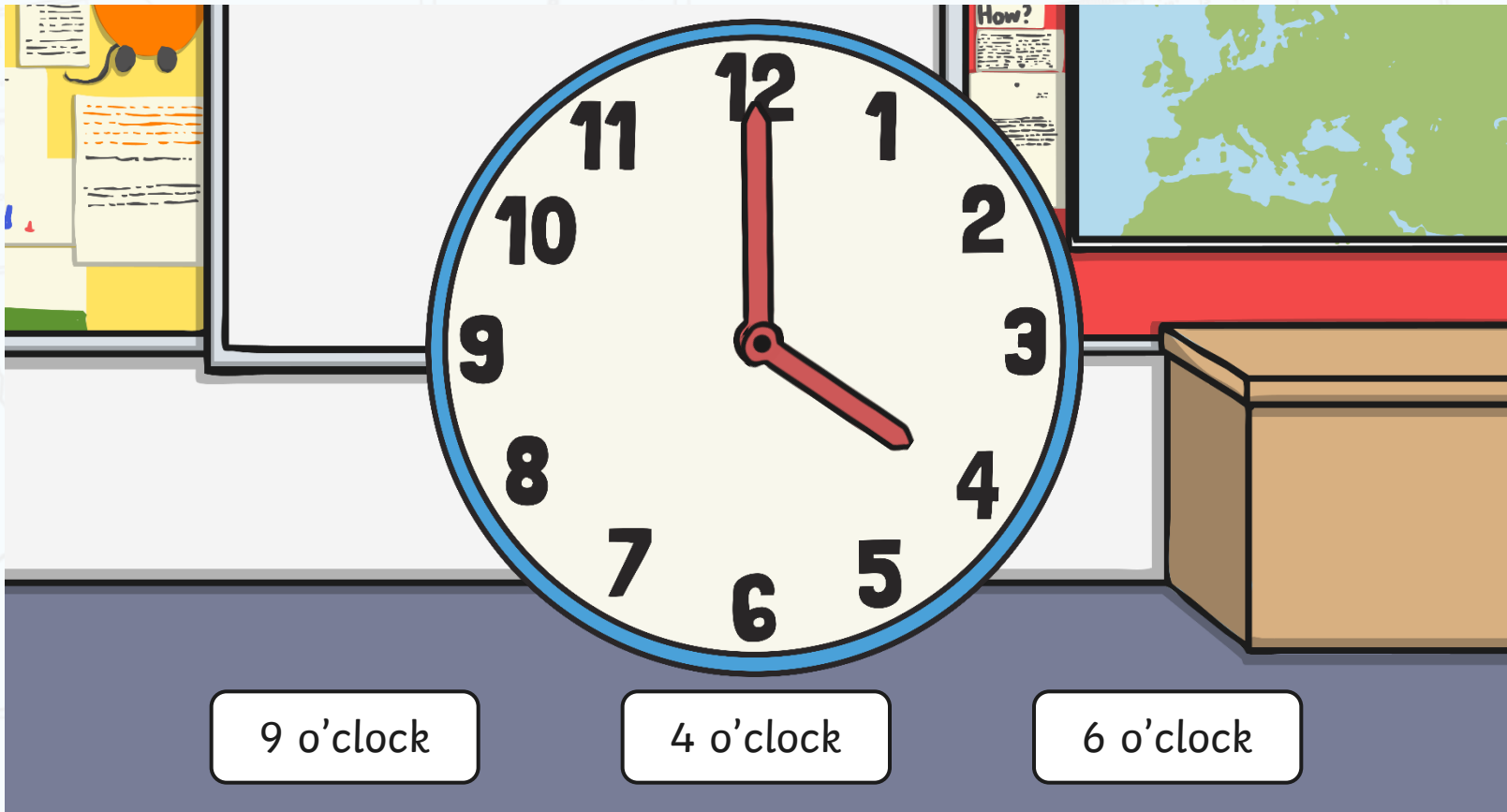

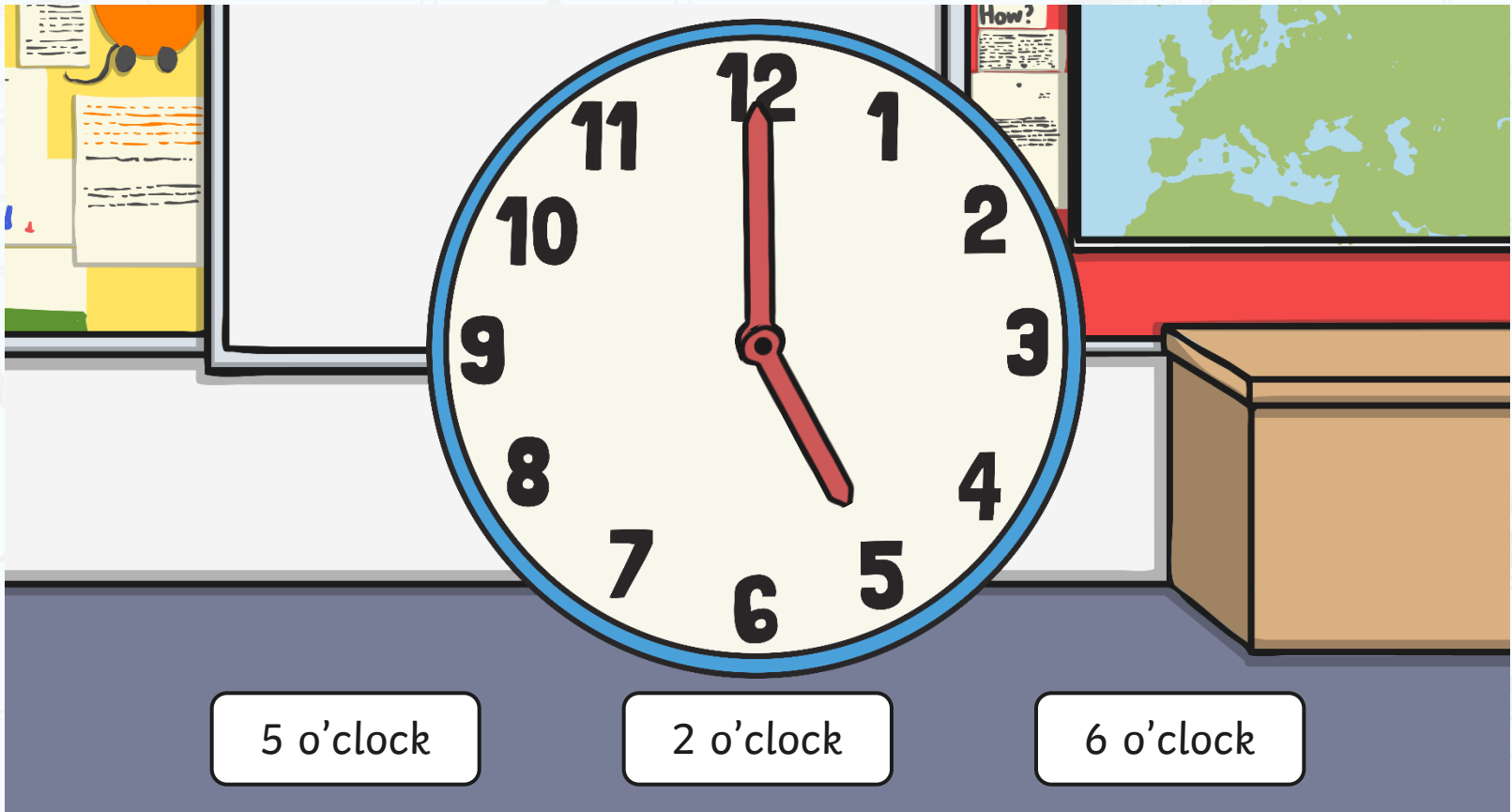
